Family History Group

Another good gathering of individuals bent on digging up (metaphorically) old relatives, all without anyone's eye's glazing over - as it is in my household! The enjoyment of discussing for 2 hours (not long enough) on the best websites/who's found a new ancestor/who's stuck on Brown/Jones, who married twice and claimed he was widowed. Plus, an ancestor who produced 13 children - all who appeared to have survived to adulthood! It is all so fascinating and sometimes by today's living, unbelievable. We also learnt, via Linda Wyman's family research, Cape Verde Island is Portuguese.

John Rennoldson, ancestor of Pat Smith, was the master of the Sir Godfrey Webster built on the Thames in 1799, and later becoming a convict ship. Arriving at Sidney New South Wales in January 1826 she carried approximately 200 convicts – the journey took almost 6 months. One website lists the names of those on board and their crimes. From convict ships the question arose as to 'what exactly does a shipwright do?' He is apparently involved in every stage of a ships construction from the drawing up to the fitting out. The knowledge of - carpentry, materials - design - and possibly architecture was essential, and presumably floatability??

We welcomed Mick Broad a past member who helped with several aspects of Family History, particularly the armed forces and the reading of old wills. His own family tree which he brought for us to see covered several desks – sadly we ran out of time to be able to study it in depth.

We included a wide range of styles and some very well-known names such as John Williams (Close Encounters of the Third Kind), Ennio Morricone (The Mission), Hans Zimmer (Rain Man and Inception), James Horner (Apollo 13) and Maurice Jarre (Lawrence of Arabia). However we also found some film music written by less well known composers such as Elmer Bernstein (To Kill a Mockingbird), Michael Kamen (Robin Hood, Prince of Thieves), Enya (May It Be from The Lord of The Rings) and Michael Nyman (Gattaca).

There is also a great deal of existing classical music which has been used in films and we heard several excerpts including *Concerto d'Aranjuez* by Rodrigo (Concerto de Orange Juice according to Pete Postlethwaite in the film *Brassed Off*), *Also Sprach Zarathustra* by Richard Strauss (2001 A Space Odyssey), Chopin's Nocturne (The Pianist), Schubert Piano Quintet The Trout (Sherlock Holmes) and Wagner's Ride of the Valkyries (Apocalypse Now).

Contemporary classical composers have also written for documentary films including Antonio Pinto (Senna) and Philip Glass (Fog of War). We indulged ourselves during our tea break by listening to some of the soundtrack to the film Amadeus, full of Mozart's best works!
