Monthly Meeting Speaker Programme

n January Sheila Dearns gave us a very interesting talk about Hedgehog Haven Rescue. Hedgehog Haven was established in 2007 by friends who have shared an interest in British wildlife for many years. They learnt of the plight of hedgehogs and their struggle to survive and decided to set up a small rescue centre in order to give them the best possible chance in life.

They are based in **Frinton and Witham in Essex** and provide a rescue and rehabilitation service, funding veterinary treatment, surgery and medication where needed. They receive hedgehogs who are victims to vehicles, poisoning by slug pellets or discarded litter. They also take in underweight autumn juveniles who would be unlikely to survive hibernation without intervention. Following over wintering at the Haven, these hedgehogs are then released back into the wild the following spring. Ideally, Hedgehogs should weigh over 600g as they approach hibernation in October / November.

They also offer people a point of contact for help, information, advice and assistance. They aim to inform as many people as possible to the needs of hedgehogs and how they can help.

It's claimed that hedgehogs could become extinct in the UK by 2025 if their current rate of decline continues.

They are an endangered species and included in the bio diversity action plan. There are several reasons for their decline, but together we can help this mammal survive the 21st century.

Hedgehog Haven Essex receives NO funding and relies solely on donations. They rescue around 500 hedgehogs a year and their annual bill totals £11,000 - this includes food, medication and vet bills. They urgently need donations to allow them to continue caring for hedgehogs, who face a bleak future of extinction.

Eat the World



ur first outing since lockdown! We 'travelled' to BRAZIL for lunch.

Brazilian food has been heavily influenced by the Portuguese colonization of the 16th century, by slaves brought from Africa, and by indigenous peoples, as well as other European, South American, and Asian countries.

Amongst the dishes we tried were MOQUECA which is a mild and creamy coconut curry lightly spiced with garlic, cumin, parsley, fish and seafood and XINXIM which is a traditional recipe from the North East of Brazil and contains chicken and prawns in a creamy parsley and peanut sauce. Another dish greatly enjoyed was LOMBINHO NA CHAPA, grilled pork loin marinated for 24 hours in Brazilian spices.

Family History

was reminded recently of a very enjoyable vacation spent many years ago to Nova Scotia, Canada, which included a visit to Halifax.

There can't be many who are unfamiliar with the tragic maiden voyage of the transatlantic liner Titanic, but for some the story ended with the film.

In the days following the sinking of the Titanic, 209 bodies were brought to Halifax the capitol city of Nova Scotia, 19 were buried in the catholic cemetery, 10 in the Jewish sector, 59 were shipped home by their families, and 121 (42 unknown) were buried in a designated corner of The Fairview Lawn cemetery Halifax.

Walking around the memorials, I was struck by the one thing they obviously all had in common, but suddenly seemed to scream out at me 15th April 1912 the date they died.

One grave inscribed J Dawson was covered in flowers. If you've seen James Cameron's film Titanic you will know Jack Dawson was the name of the handsome charismatic hero played by Leonardo DiCaPrio. James Cameron maintains he never consulted the passenger list before making the film, but he certainly started a following. The guide told us the day after the film was released a group of weeping young girls armed with flowers for J Dawson arrived, and it's continued ever since.

It's actually the grave of Joseph Dawson who worked as a coal trimmer, which involved shoveling the coal down the shute for the men below to stoke the ships furnaces.

The majority of the passengers on board were wealthy bankers and business men, possibly on their way to New York to complete business deals, and because the liner hit the iceberg just after midnight it's reasonable that the deceased would have had no identity on them.

With no body, you cannot have a death certificate. Without a death certificate no money, or assets of the deceased can be released for 7 years, (Lady Lucan can vouch for that), and not many women in 1912 were self-sufficient.

The 7 years' time lapse may have altered by now.

Over the following weeks the widows and their families travelled to Halifax in the hopes of identifying their loved ones.

According to the guide, at the time there were strong suspicions that some of the claims "Yes, that's my husband", weren't strictly true, but could not be disputed.

I find that quite a satisfying end. Instead of 'unknown' on his grave, he had a name (albeit not his own) and she went home safe in the knowledge that her family would not become destitute.
