From the Speaker Secretary

At our January meeting Bryan Thurlow gave us not so much a talk but a performance as he takes on the character of George Barrington, a retired butler 'Through the Green Baize Door'- a life in service.

Retired butler, George Barrington, a Yorkshireman through and through, looks back on a lifetime of service at Thrigsby Hall, a very grand house in Yorkshire. He started working there in 1868 as

the boot boy and worked his way up through the ranks to become butler. A very interesting snapshot of servants' lives in the Victorian and Edwardian era.

Bryan Thurlow has a background in professional theatre. During the 1970s and '80s his music hall company, The Berkeley Squares, toured its beautifully costumed shows to many parts of the country. As a great fan of the late Roy Hudd OBE he was delighted to contribute songs along with Roy to a BBC radio programme on the history of music halls. He has been involved in many TV productions and played the lead roles as Sir Isaac Newton in a CBS drama and in a BBC production, The Nicest Parson We Never Had. He was a regular holidaymaker in Hi De Hi and spent a year on a tour co-presenting shows with Noel Edmunds.

At our meeting on 10th February, Andy Marshall, a Community Safety Officer for Essex Fire and Rescue Service will be remind us about Fire Safety in the home and what it's like to be a firefighter in Essex.

On 10th March it is our AGM. Please come along and see how you can support our u3a.

For our April Meeting on the 14th, Lindsay Whitehouse's talk is 'My Life in Prison'

Lindsay worked for the Probation Service in Cumbria. He served as a Prison Governor at a number of different prisons in the Midlands and South West areas of England. Lindsay was the first Deputy Police and Crime Commissioner for Essex.


