# **EVENTS AND OUTINGS**

Our first trip of 2019 was to **Queen Elizabeth 1<sup>st</sup>'s Hunting Lodge at Epping Forest.** The lodge was built in 1543 on the orders of Henry VIII and renovated in 1589 by his daughter, Queen Elizabeth 1. It was originally built as an open grandstand-type structure from which royal guests could view and join in the hunt.

Our guide, Louise, showed us the Tudor Kitchens where two tables were set out with examples of royal hospitality and included rich foods and spices from around the world.

We also discovered that slight imperfections in the oak panelling and stone carvings were intentional – the carpenters and stonemasons believed that God's perfection couldn't be replicated and so they deliberately included mistakes in their work! One of our members will now apply that principle to her patchwork!





After a superb lunch we re-joined our coach for the short journey to the **Guide Dog Training Centre at Redbridge.** After a presentation about the difference a guide dog can make to a blind person's life, we were then shown how the handlers start to train the dogs. This was followed by an outside demonstration of how the dogs are trained to avoid obstacles in their path. We also visited the 'down-time' kennel areas where we all made a huge fuss of the dogs.

#### Today, we learnt:

- It costs £55,000 pounds to train a guide dog and keep it for life.
- There is no government funding for the guide dogs they rely solely on donations and fund-raising.
- Puppies go to their 'walkers' at around 7 weeks old and stay until they are approximately 12-14 months old, when they will return to the Training Centre for advanced training.
- People with visual impairments must 'buy' their guide dog. A monetary transaction makes them the legal owner of the dog. The cost is 50p!!!
- If, when out, you see a guide dog with their owner who has laid the harness handle flat on the dog's back, it means that they are signalling for help. Similarly, if you see a blind person with a long white cane holding it in front of them with both hands, they too are asking for help.
- New litters of puppies are all named with the same initial. A donation of £5000 means you can name your own puppy!
