French Conversation

One of the most difficult aspects of learning a foreign language is getting the grammar correct so that native speakers can understand you and you can understand them. From time to time, therefore, we look at various aspects of French grammar. In February, we looked at French expressions using the verb 'faire' (to make or to do). There was more movie music in James Horner's *A Kaleidoscope of Mathematics* from the film *A Beautiful Mind* and some very descriptive writing in a movement called *The Volcano* from Alan Hovhaness' *Symphony No 50* which is known as *Mount St Helens*. There was early music from a French composer Adam de la Halle, circa 1280, and by the German Abbess Hildegard Von Bingen.

Of course the big three H composers were well represented: we heard Handel's *Organ Concerto No 4* and an aria from *The Messiah*, Haydn's *Trumpet Concerto* and Holst's *March* from his *First Suite in E Flat* and the *Jig* from *The St Paul's Suite*. There were also contributions from Barbara Heller, Hamilton Harty, Moritz Hauptmann, Emily Hall and Reynaldo Hahn. Finally we enjoyed *Elegy for Viola and String Quartet* by Herbert Howells.

Coronavirus

What's the risk of catching coronavirus in the UK?

The NHS and Public Health England are well prepared for outbreaks of new infectious diseases. The NHS has put in place measures to ensure the safety of all patients and NHS staff while also ensuring services are available to the public as normal.

The UK Chief Medical Officers have raised the risk to the public from low to moderate. But the risk to individuals remains low. If you have arrived back to the UK from mainland China and other specified areas, follow the advice for returning travellers.

How is coronavirus spread?

Like the common cold, coronavirus (also known as Covid-19) infection usually occurs through close contact with a person with novel coronavirus via cough and sneezes or hand contact. You can also be infected by touching contaminated surfaces if you do not wash your hands.

The risk of being in close contact with a person with coronavirus or contaminated surfaces is very low at the moment, as members of the public who have visited Wuhan, Hubei province, China are currently in isolation.

Symptoms of coronavirus

The main symptoms of coronavirus are:

- · a cough
- · a high temperature
- shortness of breath

When to call 111

Based on the scientific advice of the Scientific Advisory Group for Emergencies (SAGE) the UK Chief Medical Officers are advising anyone who has travelled to the UK from mainland China, Thailand, Japan, Republic of Korea, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia or Macau in the last 14 days and is experiencing cough or fever or shortness of breath, to stay indoors and call NHS 111, even if symptoms are mild.

Do not go to a GP surgery or hospital. Call 111, stay indoors and avoid close contact with other people.

How to avoid catching or spreading germs?

Do:

- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when you cough or sneeze.
- Put used tissues in the bin straight away.
- Wash your hands with soap and water often use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water are not available.
- Try to avoid close contact with people who are unwell.

Don't:

• Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth if your hands are not clean.

**If a member has returned from one of the areas identified by the government and has any of the symptoms identified on the <u>government website</u> they should not hold interest groups in their own homes, or attend interest groups or attend monthly meetings until they have followed the NHS advice provided after calling 111

**If a U3A finds that a member has contracted coronavirus, please let the Trust know immediately

**The members of interest groups that any member with coronavirus has attended should all call 111 to ask for advice

**The monthly meeting should be cancelled for that month (and possibly longer) until the spread of the virus has been assessed.
