Family History

mily Wilding Davison.

Born South East London 1872. Died Epson 8th June 1913.

Emily's claim to fame.....she threw herself under the king's horse. Not strictly true! Evidence and film footage show she had no intention of committing suicide.

Emily was a prominent and passionate activist for the 'votes for women' movement and had spent several spells in prison including being force fed.

On 8th June 1913 she travelled to Epsom by train positioned herself at Tattenham Corner and waited. As she ignored all the other horses it's assumed she had memorised the King's racing colours, or perhaps she was waiting for a break in the field.

With her suffragette banner clutched in her hand it's believed Emily's plan was to tie it on the reins of 'Anmer' as she had done to the police horses many times in London. Unfortunately, being hit by half a ton of solid muscle travelling at approximately 45+ miles an hour hadn't occurred to her.

Emily suffered a fractured skull and died in hospital 4 days later.

In her purse (handbag) was found the return train ticket home again, a dance ticket for later that evening, plus a second banner pinned inside her coat. Her sister confirmed they had arranged to meet later that day to discuss their planned holiday.

The suffragettes' were only too happy for the population to believe Emily had committed suicide and agreed such was her devotion for the cause; she was more than capable of it. It certainly added pathos and sympathy to the movement. Although Queen Mary was quoted as saying she was a 'horrid woman'.

The autopsy's conclusion was Emily died from a fractured skull - no hoof marks were found on her body from 'Anmer'.

Little is written of Herbert Jones the jockey. An eminent and popular rider, with many winners, he was injured when 'Anmer' rolled on him, and spent several days in hospital.

His son said he was constantly haunted by the 'accident' and continued to see Emily's face as the horse hit her.

Fifteen years later his son found him in his gas filled kitchen. He had committed suicide. Take care. Jean Rogers

French Conversation



Because of Covid regulations, it's almost a year since the French group last met in the Plantation Hall. Instead, I've been circulating activities for group members to do at home. Hopefully, as more people are vaccinated and restrictions are gradually eased, we will be able to resume our normal monthly meetings.

Some of the resources we use to practise our French are articles on various aspects of French life written by a French lady called Salianne. Her latest

bulletin focuses on sniffer dogs which, as you probably know, are trained to sniff out explosives, drugs, human remains and many other things. It's said their sense of smell is a million times more developed than that of most humans.

Accordingly, the French national veterinary school has gone one step further and has been training their sniffer dogs to detect Covid 19. Maybe you're wondering how they do this? Apparently, several samples taken from people's armpits are put into cones and the dog sniffs each one. If it detects the odour of the virus, it jumps about in front of its trainer to let him/her know. According to the professor in charge of the project, 'for the animal, it's a game'. The researchers are hoping to scientifically prove these dogs' capacity to detect the virus within the next 2 - 3 weeks.

Several other countries, including Finland, Chile and the United Arab Emirates, are already using this method, particularly at their airports. It's deemed to be 95% effective, with a minimal cost compared to PCR (polymerase chain reaction) tests. I wonder if the UK will follow suit? *Jenny Parker*

n the February edition this was your rack of tiles: there was a B already on the board.




They could be made into an 8-letter word scoring 78 points, 28 plus 50 for using all the tiles.

Rumblings.
