

#### Monthly Meeting Speaker Programme

A good crowd came to the February main Meeting at the Plantation Hall to hear all about the Geology of Essex - Essex Rocks! We were fortunate to have lan and Ros Mercer from Broomfield & District u3a to talk to us as they are both experts in this field. We were taken back 500 million years to a time when this area was a muddy island. A bore hole sunk down over 300 metres in the 19th century revealed layers of slate at that time. The cross-section of the subsequent strata resembles a layer cake. It's hard to think that the southern part of the UK was once an island area off Gondwanaland and situated in the southern hemisphere, gradually moving north over the millennia while undergoing changes of climate. We heard about tropical jungle, lime mud becoming chalk deposits, puddingstone, London Clay, gravel and deposits of ash from volcanoes in Europe. Who knew that the River Thames once flowed from Wales across this area and was then diverted south to its current route by fingers of the ice sheets from the Arctic?

#### Eat the World

his month we 'travelled' to MEXICO and enjoyed a wonderful meal at El Guaca in Maldon High Street.

As is the case with many countries in today's world, Mexico was created through colonization, in this case from the Spanish. The Spanish introduced many of their own recipes and dishes into the indigenous culture, like rice, olive oil, garlic, coriander, cinnamon, and many other spices.

Today Mexican cuisine is a delicious blend of the indigenous and Spanish cuisine. It is still based on beans, corn, tortillas and chilli peppers, but these are now usually served with some sort of meat and cheese. Most dishes come with rice and spices as well.

Our group enjoyed **BURRITO** (a warm flour tortilla packed with jack cheese, grilled peppers & refried beans served with Mexican rice, sour cream and guacamole), **CHIMICHANGA** (a deep fried tortilla with cheese, grilled peppers & refried beans), **ENCHILADA** (corn tortillas filled with jack cheese, poblano chilli peppers and topped with creamy salsa) **MEXICAN PAELLA** (slow cooked Mexican rice with tiger prawns, chicken, chorizo, red salsa, peas & sweetcorn) and a delicious **TACO SALAD** (a baked tortilla basket filled with mixed leaves, tomato, cucumber, carrots, radish, onions, baby corn, avocado, fresh coriander, tossed with avocado & lime dressing).

#### Family History

t has generally been accepted by psychiatrists that for some inbred reasons we all need to know our roots.

This understanding has been a concern recently for the long term outcome of fertility donors.

This wasn't the initial thoughts of Thomas Barnardo when as a young man from Ireland he moved to London studying to become a doctor at the London Hospital. Brought up as Jewish he reverted to Christianity.

He once wrote that as a child he was selfish and thought that everything should belong to him. In London he was shocked to find the widespread poverty, disease and living conditions where 1 in 5 children died before their 5<sup>th</sup> birthday.

In 1867 he set up the first free school where children could get basic education. One evening a young lad took him on a tour around the East End of London, showing him the children sleeping on roofs and gutters. He was so appalled by what he saw he gave up his studies to become a doctor and decided to devote his life to help and care for children. So, although known as Doctor Barnardo he never actually qualified.

In 1870 he opened a home for boys in Stepney Causeway providing a shelter for orphan and destitute children. A notice stating 'no child refused' was erected when a young boy died after being refused entry, because they were full.

In 1876 homes for girls was set up, and training for 'domestic service' was provided which in turn protected them from the growing practice of 'child prostitution'. The boys were trained in carpentry and metalwork.

The forerunner of fostering was started by the Barnardo foundation, helping take off some of the strain of the huge amount of intakes. At the time of his death in 1905 his homes were caring for 8500 children in 96 homes.

The winding down of the homes progressed between the years of 1969 to 1980 with the last closing in 1980.

In contrast to the secrecy that Barnardo's once maintained it now allows descendants access to any original records.

The one mistake he seems to have made was his belief that all the children should have 'a new beginning' thereby starting a new life. Some identification the orphans had was destroyed - including some with birth information.

There is now a whole administration unit working for the thousands of families trying to piece together their ancestors/origins, including the many children sent to Australia and Canada under a not very successful repatriation scheme.
