It was spoken about people losing data, or Windows 10 failing to re-start. The moral of this is to make sure you do a complete 'backup' before attempting to install updates, as it is possible some of the software you may lose came with your computer, and backup disks were not provided. You may be able to find on your hard drive a second partition called 'Recovery' or something similar, if the worst happens, follow the prompts, and try to re-install Windows 10, but unless you did a backup you will not be able to recover your files, which may include photographs etc. A backup can be done to a large memory key at least 32 Meg, of an external hard drive which can be bought from any good computer shop.

# SUFFOLK PUNCH TRUST and SNAPE MALTINGS

# Monday 1st July

(Cost t.b.a but approx. £25)

The Suffolk Punch horse is the oldest English breed of working horse. The Suffolk Punch Trust was founded to help protect the critically endangered Suffolk horse through its established breeding programme, raising public awareness and training a new generation of professionals to work with these iconic heavy horses.





After our tour, we will go on to **Snape Maltings,** an arts complex on the banks of the River Alde at Snape, Suffolk, England. It is best known for its concert hall, which is one of the main sites of the annual Aldeburgh Festival.

The original purpose of the Maltings was the malting of barley for the brewing of beer; local barley, once malted, was sent from here to London and exported to mainland Europe. Today a collection of shops, galleries, restaurants and the Concert Hall fill the old buildings.
