A reminder for those who may be considering restarting their groups outside, you must complete the necessary risk assessment forms and submit them to the committee for approval, prior to commencement.

In recent weeks I have received two text/SMS messages purporting to be from Royal Mail, please if you receive similar treat with extreme caution.

Two examples of the type of messages going round are.

1/Your Royal mail parcel is awaiting delivery, please confirm the settlement of 1.99(GBP)on the following link.

2/ Royal Mail: Your package has a £1.99 shipping fee, to pay this now visit- then the link- your package will be returned to sender if unpaid.

Under no circumstances click on this link which would connect you to a legitimate-seeming website, then asks for personal details, including your bank details so that the payment can be taken.

The only time Royal mail would ask customers to make a payment by email/SMS is in instances where a customs fee is due. In such cases, they would also leave a grey card telling customer that there's a fee to pay before they can release the item.

This would apply either to an international customs fee or to a surcharge for an underpaid item. This card may arrive later than the email or SMS

I must thank and praise our secretary Linda for all the Sterling work and time she has, and is putting into holding Zoom meetings and practise sessions for any groups wishing to get going on zoom, what a trooper. I had the privilege of unseen observance as she took the new morphing Yoga and Well-being group through their paces, the time, energy, patience and unflagging support to all was commendable, she must be using Ever Ready Energy batteries to keep her going.

Monthly Meeting Speaker Programme

ast month our speaker was Annamaria Dall'Anese, a Blue Badge London Guide. Her subject was The Theme of Change in relation to 'The Jewels of London's Museums and Art Galleries. Her talk included artefacts from The British Museum, National Gallery, Natural History Museum, The Crystal Palace and the V and A Museum.

Annamaria started with Turner's painting The Fighting Temerie, then a self-portrait of Turner as a young artist.

She told us the histories of The Rosetta Stone and of an Egyptian parchment 'The Book of the Dead of Hunefer' which are both kept at the British Museum. Annamaria explained all about the symbolism in the painting 'The Ambassadors' by Hans Holbein.

She included the design and building of The Crystal Palace by Joseph Paxton for The Great Exhibition of 1851. It was considered an architectural innovation.

From here we moved on to the two largest skeletons in The Natural History Museum. Dippy the Diplodocus and the Blue Whale.

Most of these things our members knew of already but probably haven't visited for a long time. Perhaps it's whetted our appetite to revisit them when life returns to normal.

Family History

During lockdown I joined the Genealogy Worldwide group on Facebook. It's basically people needing help in solving a problem, or simply asking for advice.

Anyone can chip in to help. Among the helpers are a few professionals who give their services free.

I do sometimes attempt to help, but I never seem to match the speed of others providing the answer.

After 50 years of Family History I'm still discovering interesting and surprising information.

Re-registering a birth.

If the biological parents of a child born out of wedlock subsequently marry, and even if the father is on the birth certificate, they are legally required to re-register the birth thereby making the offspring legitimate. This only applies to the biological parents marrying, not if they marry other people.

Before this 1926 Re-registering Act, an illegitimate child had *no* rights where inheriting an estate was concerned. Even if they had lived their entire lives with the parents, and a legal will was in their favour, they still could not become the heirs.

The law progressed slightly in 1987 with the Family Law Reform act, removing (for legal purposes only) the divide between legitimate and illegitimate.

Although this 1926 law is now partially redundant, the re-registering is still technically valid, and could be enforced even today.

The oldest recorded 'child' re-registered, was a 40 year old man!

Workhouses.

Finding a birth that took place in a workhouse I immediately assume, homeless and destitute, but that wasn't always the case. Some workhouses had clean well equipped hospitals with qualified staff.

Quite often if a new, soon to be mother felt apprehensive or nervous, the local workhouse would, for a small charge, provide better care than the local 'midwife', and less than the hospitals of that time (no NHS), thus providing a safer birth. Never judge a book by its cover!

The prefix Step.

Prior to the 1900's where a re-marriage involving a widow or widower took place, the prefix 'step' referring to the children or parents was unheard of. The prefix 'law' was used instead. In a way it makes sense, that after marrying a widow or widower the children then (by law) became theirs. The prefix 'step' seems to have appeared mid 1930's.

This scenario actually happened to me with an 1881 census record, where the head of the house had married a widow. The 11 year old son was down as son-in-law and the 6 year old daughter was daughter-in-law. I lodged a complaint to the website that either the transcription or the enumerator's record was incorrect.

I never received a reply. A light bulb went off after reading this on the Genealogy help group website.

French Conversation

Pourquoi le 1er Avril?



In the UK, April 1st is April Fools' Day, when it's customary to play jokes on family and friends and call them 'April Fool'. In France, it's similar. Paper fish are attached to people's backs without them realising. When the prank is discovered, the perpetrator shouts **Poisson d'avril>** (April fish). The most likely origin of 1st April in France goes back to the reign of Charles

IX who, in 1564, decided to reform the calendar so that the French year began at Christmas or Easter or, in some regions, on 25th March. However, as many people either had difficulty in adopting the new calendar or were unaware that the date had changed, they continued to offer presents and tips on April 1st. They became the target of pranksters, who made fun of them by offering joke presents and calling them a <Poisson d'avril> and, voilà - a new French tradition was born.

Why a Poisson d'avril? There are several hypotheses. One suggests that fish in April are a symbol of Lent, when it is permitted only to eat fish. Another asserts that fish represent Pisces, the sign of the poisson, which is the last sign of winter. From the start of the 20th century, people sent cards illustrated with little fish, wishing each other love, friendship and good fortune. Nowadays, pranksters pin small paper fish and the words <poisson d'avril> to the backs of people walking by, which causes much laughter. **Jenny Parker**

have another story for you for those who might not have seen this in the press on 25th February. A Van Gogh drawing once stolen by the Nazis may fetch a record £7 Million at Auction. This sketch La Mousme is one of eight being sold to beat possible tax changes. The collection could raise £16 Million at Christie's in March.

This particular picture of a young woman was bought by a banker in 1920. He fled Europe in WW2 but the sketch was stolen from his house in Holland in 1940 by the Nazi but returned to the family in 1956, then sold to an Art dealer in 1983. LaMousme is a copy of his oil painting in the National Gallery of Art in Washington DC. The sale also includes 3 other paintings, one a Freud valued at £1.7 Million.



"Nowt so queer as folk" Grandpa would say as he settled on a park bench to watch people; a fantastic pastime. How about waves coming onto shore, all different but with a rhythmic sound. Much is mundane but occasionally— — —.

Moving a straw bale wall and uncovering a hedgehog nest, mum and four very young babies, still pink and with white, soft, bendy quills, moved them and didn't tell the gamekeeper. The scream of a leveret is blood curdlingly human. I had caught it (poacher fashion, no traps) to move it to a safer location. A bit of fun!



On July 20th 1969, as commander of the Apollo 11 lunar module, Neil Armstrong was the first person to set foot on the moon. His first words after stepping on the moon, "that's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind," were televised to earth and heard by millions. But, just before he re-entered the lander, he made the remark "good luck, Mr. Gorsky. NASA"

thought it was a casual remark concerning some rival soviet cosmonaut. However, upon checking, there was no Gorsky in either the Russian or American space programs. Over the years, people questioned Armstrong as to what the 'good luck, Mr. Gorsky' statement meant, but Armstrong always just smiled. On July 5, 1995, in Tampa Bay, Florida, while answering questions following a speech, a reporter brought up the 26-year-old question about Mr. Gorsky. This time he finally responded, his Mr. Gorsky had just died, so Neil Armstrong felt he could now answer the question. Here is the answer: "who was Mr. Gorsky". In 1938, when he was a kid in a small mid-western town, he was playing baseball with a friend in the backyard. His friend hit the ball, which landed in his neighbour's yard by their bedroom window. His neighbours were Mr. And Mrs. Gorsky. As he leaned down to pick up the ball, young Armstrong heard Mrs. Gorsky shouting at Mr. Gorsky, "sex! You want sex?! You'll get sex when the kid next door walks on the moon!" It broke the place up. Neil Armstrong's family confirmed that this is a true story.



A thief in Paris planned to steal some paintings from The Louvre. He planned it well and got past security, stole the paintings and made it safely to his van.
