Photography Group

Our April assignment was to photograph a "closeup" of any subject. Once again our creative members managed to capture a wide variety of subjects ranging from the most popular, involving flowers and backlit seed pods through watch mechanisms and paintings on porcelain to the skeletal remains of a monkey. The modern compact digital camera is a technical masterpiece. Even using the "auto" setting they can take photos which are very close to the subject and still get the correct exposure and accurate focusing. This feature leaves the photographer the real job of composing the picture and producing an image the viewer will find both finely detailed and pleasing to Some of the more adventurous can look at. always find a little button on their camera which enables them to get even closer. Fortunately in the true spirit of the U3A they are always willing to share their discovery with the other group members. Close-up photos require the camera to be near to the subject and if it is close to the ground it presents a new set of problems. Carol's photo of a hellebore was one such. She graphically described how she managed it, prompting a discussion on various alternative positioning techniques, including balancing the camera on your foot - the lengths our members go to in their pursuit of their art!

We did also take a quick look at more advanced methods of taking a close-up for those who own a SLR camera. These included close-up extension tubes and a simple device for reversing the lens, a technique similar to the idea of looking through the wrong end of a telescope (but when you do it on a camera the image comes closer!)

Spurred on by a mutual love of reading they begin a correspondence. Other members of the Society join in culminating in the author moving to Guernsey to live and ultimately fall in love with her first correspondent.

The story contained interesting information about the stresses and dangers of life under the German occupying forces. All the more interesting as this was the only part of the British Isles the Germans were ever able to infiltrate during the war.

Little is known about the considerable hardships and bravery of the islanders during that time and from that point of view we found the story very interesting.

All in all a charming book using war time facts and stories to add drama and depth.
