We were a small, selective group this time as so many people seemed to have gone to the Royal Opera House rather than walk round a chilly bird reserve.

We were met at Tollesbury Wick by Jonathan the site warden and shown the rare breed sheep that live on the marsh. There were no lambs this year as there were not enough EWT volunteers to help with lambing. We walked down to the hide to see what was still around on the scrape, that big shallow lake in the centre of the reserve. The answer was 'not a lot'. All the geese have now gone north to breed as have many of the waders. What is left are our faithful residents; several types of duck (pochard, shell, tufted etc.) and 11 beautiful avocets looking for nesting sites.

Back up on the sea wall we were given a flying display by two Marsh Harriers high above us and showing off to each other. It is hard to believe that such big birds can be so agile and graceful. Not to be out done a Kestrel hovered overhead and a couple of Common Terns flew past. The mud flats are alive with waders, few as striking to look at as the Oyster Catchers.

For any true 'twitchers' out there - on Tuesday I saw a bird you usually have to go to Scotland or Norway to see. Slumming it at Tollesbury was this amazing Ida Duck.

#### **Reading and Books Group**

ate Adie has the reputation of being one of the Most courageous correspondents of her day. We were pleased therefore to have a nonfiction book this month written by Kate Adie, "Into Danger, Risking Your Life for Your Work". However, many of the members did not enjoy this book because they felt it failed to tell us much about the writer herself and why throughout her career she has regularly reported from the world's most dangerous war zones, often placing her own life at serious risk. Instead, Kate Adie wrote about a variety of people who chose a career in danger, like stunt people, landmine exploders, and even a 96 yearold "snake man". One example was Gie Couwenbergh, from Belgium who had spent his career as a naval diver. He was just finishing a Nato exercise in 1987 when the call came that a ferry had capsized just off the port of Zeebrugge. He was airlifted on to the side of the Herald of Free Enterprise and lowered down a 20ft rope, through a broken window into darkness. He jumped another 10ft and landed among desperate survivors where he had one rope to haul them out, one by one. In every interview, printed at the end of each chapter Adie asked her subjects one last question about their career: "In the name of what?" The answers given range from adventure to duty, to enjoyment, but trying to make sense of why people rise to an enormous challenge, was a challenge in itself.
