From the Speaker Secretary

In April the speaker was the Rev'd Dr Nicholas Henderson, who took us on a whistle-stop tour of the English Country Church through the centuries. The church is often the oldest building in a village and the site will often pre-date the church having been used for earlier forms of worship. Yew trees found in graveyards hint to pagan use, as a yew grove was considered to be a sacred place, but was later taken over by early Christians to build a church. The Green Man, with foliage coming from his mouth, can be found as carvings in churches and this may have come from Norse mythology.

Christianity arrived quite early in England with the oldest known Saxon church founded at Cirencester in the 4th century. Early churches were quite simple in structure, many using recycled Roman bricks and tiles which you might spot in a herringbone pattern in the walls. The Normans built churches with stronger arches and buttresses were introduced to support towers. The Reformation brought about many changes with items brought into the churches from abbeys and monasteries that had been destroyed. Colourful interiors were painted over and Rood Screens removed leaving odd features high up in a wall such as stairs or a doorway, as found in St Mary's on the Hythe, which would have led to a Rood loft. Over the centuries many different styles have been introduced, rebuilding and adaptations to current use that still continue today. You might like to spot the gargoyles on the outside of a church, where stonemasons had a free hand to carve grotesque images to spout the water out over the edge.

The next main meeting takes place on Friday 13th May at 2.00 pm at Heybridge Plantation Hall, when Martyn Garwood's talk is 'My Life with Dogs'. Martyn was a Police Dog Handler for over 20 years. When he retired from the Police his life took an interesting change of direction, but still involved with dogs. You will have to come and find out what happened.

On Friday 10th June we are not having a speaker but holding An Exhibition of Work from the groups within Heybridge u3a. It always impresses me how many talented members we have in our u3a.

In July (Friday 8th July) we are celebrating summer with A Strawberry Tea and Quiz.

Barbara joined Heybridge u3a when it started in 2009. Early on she became involved in u3a activities and volunteered to help. Peter Thorpe remembers: "I knew Barbara in the early days of our U3A. She supported me in my first years as chairman by accepting the office of the Treasurer. We worked harmoniously together throughout my term and I was always so grateful that we were able to sort problems out very quickly while they were still little problems and before they grew

bigger. I was always impressed how kind and enthusiastic she was with everything she did for Heybridge U3A, she will be missed and we will never forget her."

Over the last 13 years Barbara was also Interest Groups Co-ordinator, became CoG of the Petanque Group and played enthusiastically into her late eighties, as well as being a member of the Creative Writing group, penning many an interesting piece. She volunteered to proof-read the News Sheet and certainly few errors got by her over the years. She joined the Art group and brought along the refreshments, hosted the Ukulele Group at her house and happily strummed along with them, entertaining us at the Christmas meeting and doing 'gigs' at places like the Heybridge Basin Regatta, only giving it up at the start of the pandemic. She also persuaded members to take their turn at serving refreshments at the main meetings and set up a rota for the 'Meeters and Greeters'. She went along to the Lunch group whenever possible, then in the last few years she started the Painting 2 group and when we couldn't meet due to Covid restrictions. embarked upon a series of over 50 paintings at home, avidly watching TV programmes like 'Portrait Artist of the Year' for inspiration. When the Needlecraft group started to meet in members' gardens she came along with a project or two but mostly for company and a chat and we heard about her involvement with the St Clare's Hospice craft group, her family and her life including a long association with Blackwater Sailing Club. It was touching to hear they were flying their flag at half mast the weekend she passed away.

Over the last two years she often phoned people for a chat, maybe about a problem with the computer, how many bags she had made on the sewing machine, or even how many laps of the house and garden she had done. When in 2021 she unfortunately had a stroke she made a good recovery, making sure she did all the exercises and got herself as fit as she could. More recently the purchase of a mobility scooter was a hot topic.

Barbara was the perfect u3a member, a good friend and her drive and enthusiasm were an inspiration to us all. We will miss her.
