From the Chairman

The purchase of the projector, our highest priority asset has caused lan and myself a great deal of frustration over the past weeks. Perversely, our frustration was caused through trying to get a large national computer sales company to take our money. The humiliating experience of having a cheque refused caused me to reflect on what we were doing and why we were doing it. Those adult humans who are in the financially competitive, acquisitive and breeding phase of their life cycle and who cannot, and do not wish to, see what is coming! We are told that we know when we have reached our "Third Age". What we do not know is that it can be the greatest opportunity we will have to be ourselves, to be able to do things just because we can, to discover the simple pleasure of learning new things together in friendship without the external pressures of targets and exams. I also realise that the U3A has given me many new friends, nice people that I probably would never have met. It has given me a purpose to do things without thinking of profit and it has rekindled old interests, which could have passed on by. The Third Age Trust is a success. There are 760 U3As and approximately a guarter of a million members in the UK and it is growing fast. I am glad I joined. It is one of life's best kept secrets and it seems that only those who know that they are in their "Third Age" are able to understand what the secret is. Why not pass it on and spread the knowledge!

Stuart Baldwin, our speaker at the May meeting, also discussed life cycles. He was the son of a bee

keeper and a life long bee keeper himself. He gave an excellent PowerPoint presentation with amazing photos and was obviously an authority on his subject. I was interested to learn that bees make honey to enable the colony to survive through the winter and that over the centuries humans have stolen vast quantities of this vital liquid and given them back sugar water to make do with instead. If I were a bee I would sting those who attempted to steal my stash, but luckily I am not a bee!

The July meeting takes the form of a Strawberry Tea. We also hope that most of the groups will have displays showing us what they do/learn/create/enjoy etc. With the exception of the painting group who had a superb display of their work at the AGM, it will be the first time all groups can "show case" their activities together. 
Petanque Group

Millau Viaduct by Gill Thorne

Just over 4 years ago I was amazed by the photos of the Millau Viaduct in France, the "bridge above the clouds". Having watched a programme called Megastructures which detailed the idea for the



bridge over the River Tarn to connect two motorways and make the journey Spain far easier (together with all the details of the actual building) myself, my late husband and

two friends decided we had to see it for ourselves.

As it was about 600 miles away and too far for a day trip we decided to make a holiday of our trip. That is another story but the actual experience of this incredible bridge was breathtaking. Various friends were very envious and we know of many others who have now been there themselves. This bridge was designed by Norman Foster (the architect of the Millennium Bridge).

From about 5 miles away we could see the bridge in the distance, the sun came out, the temperature

rose and the bridge grew larger. We arrived at the bridge and approached the toll booths. Unbelievably there was not a single vehicle



in front of us so having talked to the lady in the tollbooth about where to go afterwards to see the bridge we proceeded along the bridge, going very slowly, with nothing ahead of us. At the far end we travelled for about 5 miles, came off the motorway and drove through the mountains to a "panorama" above the village where we could see the whole bridge across the valley. We stayed there for ages just marvelling. It was the highlight of our holiday.

One of the most important factors in the building of this bridge was that there were no major accidents and I would suggest that if this programme is shown again it should not be missed. Although I have a



number of photos there are about 1000 images on Bing. I appear to have a slight obsession with bridges. I love them, and pictures are

another obsession. Unfortunately I have no artistic talent so can only wonder at others.

(Technical Data from the Editor)

The structural type is a seven pylon, cable-stayed, fan arrangement bridge. Construction took place between October 2001 and December 2004 with up to 480 workers on site at a cost €400 million. There are six main spans, each 342m long, with a maximum pylon height of 340m and 270m above valley bottom (water level). The overall length is 2.5km. Material quantities included, concrete 127,000m³, steel 5,000 tonnes and earth moving 300,000m³.
