We had two outings this month, the first was an 04.30 start to listen to the dawn chorus at Abberton. It was a chilly morning as we see off, very quiet at first but soon we were surrounded by noise, the Robin and Wren are both small birds, but gosh, they are great singers. The Nightingales did sing for us but not as many as three years ago. The hedgerows were alive with song as we walked along and it was hard to distinguish one song from the other. Luckily we had Liz with us who pointed out Great Tits, Chaffinch, Whimbrel and Blackbird. We made our way towards the water with Skylarks singing overhead also Swifts darting around after their breakfast. We spotted a corn bunting and both Pied and Yellow Wagtails.

Lots of activity on the water with Teal, Greenshank, Gadwall and Tufted Ducks.

As we made our way into the visitors centre three hours later we were all looking forward to the cooked breakfast waiting for us; a great treat. What a wonderful way to start the day.

Blue house farm was our next outing. We had hoped to see the baby Barn Owls but this year they were a month later in laying their eggs (hope to fit in an evening visit later) so Jill, Pat, Brenda, myself and Tim, the warden, set off not expecting to see much activity as only idiots would be out. It was so cold with driving rain, it could only get better!!! Most of the birds were keeping in the dry but we did see Sky Larks, Swallows, Pied and Yellow Wagtails, Reed Bunting and Reed Warbler as we made our way to the first hide. Ducks don't mind the rain so they were having a great time splashing round; we saw Redshank, Shoveler, Little Grebe and Widgeon. We were getting cold now as we had been watching a group of Lapwing chicks for ages. As we approached the next hide we again watched chicks, Mallards this time. Tim picked them up and put them back under cover in their nest as they were right outside the door of the hide, hope you like the Chick picture taken by Jill.

Italian Conversation

In order to avoid the Bank Holiday Monday, the Beginner's Italian Group met on Tuesday 7th May. After discussing what we had been up to since the last meeting we went on to learn how to say numbers in Italian, from one to millions. We also learnt the single Italian words used for 'about ten', 'about twenty', 'about thirty', etc, and 'about a hundred' and for 'about a thousand'. Numbers are written out as one word, so when writing cheque for 25,359 Euros the Italians would write the Italian equivalent twentyfivethousandthreehundredandfiftynine Euro. When they still had the lira the situation was even worse, as the lira was worth so little. Then even longer numbers very often had to be written out as a single word, as it was quite common for them to have to write out cheques for over 1,000,000 lire, since that was only worth about £500.

Various topics were discussed, including subjects we have studied in the past or are studying now, jobs that we or family members have done, and the interesting history of the home of one of the members. For example, we first removed wiring to items such as disc drives, CD drives, power units, and finally the CPU (Central Processing Unit - the main hardware 'chip'), together with fans and memory chips. We finally removed the complete 'Motherboard' (printed circuits), leaving just the empty shell of the cabinet.

The hard part was to re-assemble the computer, remembering where everything belonged, and return it to a

working state. All this in a couple of hours. The nerve wracking part was then to switch-on, and test to see that everything functioned correctly.
