Heybridge U3A Monthly Meeting

The speaker at our next Monthly Meeting on 13th June will be William Tyler, as previously published. His connections with The U3A date back to the time when the idea was first being floated. He was a founder member of The Forum of The Rights to Education for The Elderly (FREE) which predated The U3A in England.

William, a Freeman of The City of London and awarded the MBE for services to adult education, has spoken to U3As in various English Counties, in Valetta (Malta) and in Ljubljana, Slovenia. He spent his whole professional life in adult education.

The title of his talk is "A Tangled Romance: Edward and Mrs Simpson". The Great Love Affair of the 20th Century? Hardly. An Unimportant minor royal story? Hardly.

The King's desire to marry "The Woman He Loved" led to a constitutional crisis which gripped the Nation. In retrospect, however, with their Nazi links, we can only give thanks that they never reigned as King and Queen.

The venue, as usual, will be Plantation Hall, Heybridge, starting at 14:00.

Canada and Grey Lag Geese were on the banks as we motored along . Stacey pointed out Lapwing, Red Shank, Shelduck and not so often seen Whimbrel. We also watched a lone Kestrel hunting along the grass bank for prey. After we had run aground a couple of times Stacey decided it was time to make our way back to Mersea. We spotted a couple of Avocets feeding on the shore line. We had hoped to see more of them today, even some with young ones but were not in luck.

We made our way back with a little spray coming into the boat but thankfully the day had stayed dry. We all agreed it had been a great morning and just to be out on the water was fun.

I am not sure yet what we are doing next month as this is going to be a hard trip to follow.

Photography Group

odern cameras are superb instruments, both optically and electronically. At our May meeting, we returned to the subject of how to obtain the correct exposure for photographs. We recognised that for the majority of shots, taken in good daylight and using the camera in the auto mode we can be confident of taking an acceptable photo. It is only when the subject is lit in a non typical way, such as bright snow or in a woodland setting that the camera gets it wrong and we discussed how to use some of the manual adjustments to achieve the correct exposure in tricky lighting conditions. photographer wants to achieve a better than average photo he/she needs to imagine the finished picture and understand which adjustments are required before pressing the button.

The assignment for April was "blue". I was relieved that no one interpreted the subject as a "blue-movie". Flowers, flags and sky were well represented. Bluebells were popular, both in close-up detail and as woodland carpets. Collages

of different blue coloured flowers were especially effective. Well observed landscape photos with blue sky and blue water reflected in glass covered buildings were also chosen as subjects. Several members used everyday blue objects in close-up to great effect. One member produced an effective alternative interpretation, using a simple .composition of wrapped sweets and careful attention to lighting and camera settings. In the image accompanying this report, the author has also skilfully controlled the point of focus to guide the eye to the subject.



The assignment for June is "May" and can include any photograph taken since the April meeting. It can also be combined with the members alternative assignment suggestion i.e. the controlled use of depth of field to give a differential focusing effect (see the accompanying blue photo!). We can expect a wide variety of images from our creative members at the June meeting!

If you want to discover your "photographer's eye", please come along and join us on Thursday June 5th, we have plenty of room. Whether you are completely new or experienced, you will be welcome. Our only aim is to enjoy our photography, by sharing and improving our skills together.
