#### **Local History Group**

Once most of us had overcome the vagaries of sat-nav or hazy directional memories, we were delighted to find the joy of Jaywick, indeed the leaning Martello tower of Jaywick. This was constructed in 1809 as one of the 104 built to defend the country against a Napoleonic invasion. The brick walls of the east coast towers are 12 feet thick at the seaward side and 8 feet thick at the land side and 40 feet I height – that's a lot of bricks, all brought by barge from Grays. The Jaywick tower started to subside and lean as soon as it was built and became an engineering project to right it. Of course, the Napoleonic invasion remained only a threat but the towers were at various times occupied by the military, lastly during the Second World War.

The grand Georgian facade of Wingfield College conceals a rare mediaeval survival: the remnants of a chantry college of priests complete with a cloister walk and a Great Hall. It is associated with many important and colourful historical characters,



including The Black Prince, Mary Tudor, Henry VIII and the de la Pole family (the Dukes of Suffolk and one of the most powerful families in mediaeval England).
