#### **Family History Group**

ur May meeting was yet another fascinating dip into the world of family history.

#### What did we do before the NHS?

We explored how the poorer sections of society managed before the birth of the NHS. This lead us on to discussion about the Bryant and May match-girls strike in 1888.

The strike was caused by the poor working conditions in the match factory, including fourteen-hour work days, poor pay, excessive fines and the severe health complications of working with white phosphorus, such as phossy jaw. Many of these girls would have been unable to pay for medical attention and probably had a short life-span.

Incidentally, if you fall ill and need to go to hospital, make sure that it is not on the 1<sup>st</sup> Wednesday in August............ Ask a family history member if you would like the answer!!

#### Victorian Death photography

We had a bit of a morbid theme running through our meeting as discussion led on to the Victorian custom of photographing their dead as a way of commemorating them and softening the rawness of grief. In images that would be unthinkable to us today, families pose with the dead, infants appear asleep and ladies recline on chaise-longue.

#### **The Witchfinder General**

Eventually, we got on to the topic of Matthew Hopkins (c.1620– 12 August 1647). He was an English witch-hunter whose career flourished during the English Civil War. He claimed to hold the office of Witchfinder General, although that title was never officially bestowed by Parliament. His witch-hunts mainly took place in East Anglia with many witches coming from Maldon, Hatfield Peverel and Kelvedon.

#### **Maldon Cemetery**

On a somewhat lighter note, Linda told us about the clearance work taking place at Maldon Cemetery in London Road. Areas which had previously been overgrown have been cut back, cleared and tidied up. We all agreed that cemeteries were very interesting places to visit for a family historian.

#### Cape Verde

#### **Local History Group**

We had ideal weather for our visit to Colchester although the wind whistled through the archway of the St John's Abbey gatehouse whilst we were given a wealth of information about this historic place, of which only the gatehouse remains. It was built on the site of a Saxon church which was excavated in the 1970s when it was found that the church had been built on the site of a Roman cemetery. The Benedictine monastery was established in 1096 when the construction was led by Eudo Dapifer, steward of William I. After an enjoyable lunch at the Roman Circus Centre we had a guided tour there led by a member of the Colchester archaeological group who, together with the excellent displays, gave us a very clear picture of how this chariot racing stadium must have looked in its heyday. Our walk to the marked out perimeter really brought home the size of the structure. It's the only evidence of a Roman circus found in this country.

#### **GLEMHAM HALL**

After a clear run up the A12 to Woodbridge, we swept into the Humphrey Repton designed grounds of Glemham Hall and were instantly transported back to a simpler time – a typical, pastoral Elizabethan 'big house' complete with sheep and cattle grazing in the grounds – the only thing missing were the milkmaids!

Glemham Hall was built around 1560 by the De Glemham family. A succession of owners, many of them politicians, occupied the Hall until 1923 when it was purchased by the Cobbold family (of Tolly Cobbold brewing fame) in whose hands it has remained ever since.

The current owner is Philip Hope-Cobbold, a larger-than-life, mildly eccentric character whose pride in his family home is evident from the moment you meet him. He has a very dry sense of humour and a twinkle in his eye for mischief!

After a very welcome refreshment break, served by Phillip himself, we were led through dining rooms, sitting rooms, libraries, bedrooms, attic rooms which would have housed servants right down to the cellars which are currently used on 'shoot days'. There were ancestral portraits galore, shelf after shelf of dusty books and threadbare carpets that had seen better days. No heating apart from the huge fireplaces! We visited on quite a windy day and you could hear the noise of the wind whistling through the windows and doors!

There were whimsical touches of humour throughout the house – if you do ever visit, make sure you get to see the last occupant of the attic bedrooms!

Luckily the weather was fine enough to take a stroll around the beautiful gardens and from the outside we could appreciate the different additions to the building over the years.

We stopped for lunch at The Crown Inn in Glemham village and were made very welcome by the owners. A slow pootle back down the A12 and we were home in time for tea!

Glemham Hall is only open to the general public on certain days of the year under the 'Invitation to View' scheme. The next openings will be June 6<sup>th</sup> and July 10<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup> 22<sup>nd</sup>.
