This months group met to discuss Rose Tremain's 'The way I found Her'. Several members of the group had read books by her in the past. She was therefore recommended as a good read. However, this particular book, although well written, was light on plot which most of us failed to follow. It was said that it was deemed a psychological thriller. However, none of us saw it this way and we were confused as to the point of the story.

It was a story about a thirteen year old boy, living during the school holidays in Paris with his mother, who was a translator for Valentina, a best selling author and exotic émigré. Valentina casts a spell over the boy but this enchanted world in which he lives is gradually lost as her past encroaches on their lives and Lewis is driven on a terrifying quest to save her.

Almost to a woman we felt that we spent much of the book confused, and unable to suspend belief, which seemed to be what was expected from this narrative. Ultimately, we became somewhat disinterested in the fate of them all.

Maybe we missed the point of the story for none of us 'got' it. Rose Tremain writes about very diverse subjects and some of her stories are very enjoyable. We all agreed that this one was less so.

With our increasing membership, we are hoping for many more lively discussions, which all our books seem to engender enjoyed or otherwise. We are supported well by the local library and we hope that the ideas they have will give us a chance to try different books and maybe take part in activities other than just reading, but of course book related.
