We then viewed member's pictures of last month's assignment - to produce a single photograph, which obeyed one or more of the compositional rules we had been discussing. The images were varied and well thought through and we could see that many of the techniques had been used to good effect.

The photo "Olympic Rings" pictured below is an excellent example of use of the rules of "thirds" as well as those of symmetry and framing. The bascules of Tower Bridge are on the lower third and the high level walkway is on the upper third, whilst the red bus is positioned a third of the way across the bascules. The tall buildings in the background are well framed within the view under the bridge and the subject is framed within the bridge structure. Careful composition has made this imposing photograph very pleasing to look at.

Reading and Books Group

We had yet another very pleasant and interesting meeting this month enhanced by some delicious home made cake brought along by Angela Pleasance who was celebrating her birthday. We were also very pleased to welcome Angela's sister, who joined us for the afternoon. Happily, she had read the book and we were delighted that she was able to contribute to our group discussion.

This month's book was The Secret River by Kate Grenville. It has to be said that it was a sad book, beautifully written but, at times, almost unbearable with the weight of loss. It described, very vividly, the poverty of life in London in the early eighteen hundreds, where a young man is happily married to his childhood sweetheart and working hard as a Waterman on the Thames. Life is rough but bearable until William gets caught up in the criminality rife in that type of work at that time.

For his crimes he is sentenced to transportation to New South Wales for the term of his natural life. The only saving grace is that he can take his family with him.

Using his skills that he had learnt on the Thames he finds an ideal place to settle and trade. However, the land where he makes his home is already the home of the indigenous people, the Aborigine. Can these people and the white settler share the land? The cut and thrust of living together in the same area gives rise to a compelling and atmospheric story incorporating the issues of love, identity, belonging and fear.

Kate Morton is from Sydney Australia and the story has some autobiographic elements in that it tells the tale of an ancestor who was forced, by virtue of his need to survive in an alien environment, to travel a road of often painful self questioning and self discovery. However, she does not flinch from the historical facts, many of which are unpleasant and cruel, but which are part of the origins of the present day Australia.

We all very much enjoyed this passionate and often disturbing historical novel. It gave rise to interesting discussions about the struggles of those early convict settlers in Australia who, in order to survive, settled and farmed land to which, from today's perspective, they had no entitlement.

How, encouraged by the arrogance of the homeland they used their weapons and relative wealth to secure a place on this continent and lay the foundations for the Australia we see today. Leaving, we decided, a legacy of sadness and dereliction for the deposed indigenous people.

We hope to establish a website for the group in the near future, a job probably for the colder winter months, because we are all hoping summer will come and we can enjoy the great outdoors over the coming weeks!!
