ue to various maladies affecting our group, we were slightly depleted in numbers for our visit to Nevertheless, Kevin our guide gave us an enthusiastic introduction to some of the Bradwell. splendours of Bradwell village. We saw the very imposing St. Thomas's church, with the village lock-up built into its boundary wall to one side and the much worn mounting steps to the other side. The village has several lovely cottages and amidst them we saw the glorious and imposing childhood home of 'Warhorse' author Michael Morpurgo, whose family departed the village on hearing that a nuclear power station was about to be built. The pub opposite the church has now regained all its wonderful features, after the fire that all but destroyed it a few years ago, and is again a great asset to the village - though sadly not open for our visit. Some of us, however, had been lucky enough to find the newly opened café and others the hospitality of the community shop-cum-post office [yes, they have one of those in Bradwell!]. We'd parked by the, now rather sad-looking, A. H. Mackmurdo designed village hall and from here Kevin led us in convoy out to Othona. At Othona we walked over to where St Cedd built his cathedral of St Peter-on-the wall in 653, on the site, and using the remains of, the roman fort of Othona. After later periods of disuse and use as a barn, the building was restored as a place of worship in 1920, in the care of the Othona community. This is such an atmospheric place, with the chapel and the surrounding views and the sense of history. We were made very welcome for refreshments at the Othona centre which now resides in a group of very eco-friendly buildings and currently also boasts a group of yurts as luxury accommodation.

It was such a surprise and it greatly exceeded all my expectations. Robert, who is a U3A member, was the artist who designed the crest. He was also the Principal Officer at the MDC who submitted the design to the College of Heraldry for approval, resulting in their official Grant of Alms to the Council in 1976. Robert even had the responsibility of organizing the casting of the metal copies, one of which was captured



as an image inside Pat's camera. Now having explained what it is who knows where it is?
