Eat the World

ur first 'Eat the World' experience saw us eating at '**Sark' Turkish restaurant** in Maldon.

Although meat-based foods such as kebabs are the mainstay in Turkish cuisine, native Turkish meals largely centre on rice, vegetables and bread.

We had a mix of starters including babaganoush (a roasted aubergine dip); spinach Tarator (spinach & garlic in a yoghurt sauce); patlican soslu (aubergine with onions, mixed peppers, garlic and tomato sauce) served with flatbreads.

Main courses were delicious: chicken shish, lamb beyti, vegetable mousakka and falafel all served with a very colourful Turkish salad.

At £8.95 per person for a two-course lunch, we all agreed that this represented excellent value for money. Most of us will return to sample the much larger evening menu.

We settled to the sound of Dusty Springfield, signifying that this time we were exploring what the letter D could offer. As usual we found a great deal of interesting music, starting with a work called *Dies Natalis* by Finzi, written in 1938. We also heard from a contemporary of Mozart named Carl Ditters von Dittersdorf, Carl Davis' score for The World at War, and the beginning of the *Requiem* by Duruflé.

We found a Double Bass concerto by a 19th Century composer named Bottesini and the Pachobel Canon played on a Dulcimer. We watched The Bolshoi Ballet dance the Mazurka from *Coppelia* by Delibes and we heard two pieces by Dvorak, firstly a symphonic poem called *The Golden Spinning Wheel* and then the first movement of his *Cello Concerto* played by Jacqueline Du Pré.

Gustavo Dudamel conducted his youthful orchestra in a wonderfully energetic performance of *Mambo* by Bernstein and Duke Ellington played *Black Brown and Beige*. Dietrich Fischer-Diskau gave a wonderful slow moment with a song by Schubert and we saw a show of drumming by a Swiss Corps relayed from the Edinburgh Festival. We finished with film of Luciano Pavarotti singing *Una Furtiva Lacrima* by Donizetti, Patrick Doyle's incidental music for *Henry V* and John Dankworth's music for the film *Modesty Blaise*.
