## **Family History**

June

The end of June saw six serious faced ladies trying to unravel the story of Arthur Brown - there are millions of them I can hear you say - and there are!

Very uncivilized of him not being Zachariah Algernon Ponsonby, it would have been a doddle.

F/H member Diane was brought up, like so many of us with a family story. Her one was of Uncle Arthur, who according to her mother died aged 5. No other information.

He is listed with the family in the 1911 census, but no age was given, which usually means the child is under one year old. If this was the case Arthur's birth would possibly be 1910/1911.

And so, an enjoyable two hours went very quickly, with a great deal of suggestions and laughter.

One month later and Arthur had been found. His appearance on the census came about by a mistake made by his father, who assumed he had to list all his seven children, dead or alive ..... hence no age included, but realising his error he crossed out the entry.

I began a new search starting from his parent's marriage, and found Arthur had actually been born 1899, ten years before our misguided estimate. He was the second of seven children (at the time) born to his parents Thomas and Elizabeth.

Sadly, at the moment no death for Arthur has been located. He is not listed in the 1901 census, so he may have died before he was aged two.

A satisfying end to the Arthur Brown saga – part one.
