## From the Chairman

It does not seem possible that August has passed and that we are now into September. As the hours of daylight get less and autumn approaches, we will have to get used to doing more things inside again. All of which makes me think about our groups and I am delighted that the Books and Reading Group has out-grown being able to meet "at home" and will now regularly meet at the Plantation Hall. We are lucky to have such a venue in Heybridge and I think that it is good for the image of the U3A to have our larger groups using the Plantation Hall for their meetings.

He discussed the design of a typical Thames Barge and described what life was like for the crew as they plied their trade around the coastal waters of south east England. Some of the flat bottomed craft sailed across the channel and along the south coast to Cornwall. Only a handful of barges now remain out of a fleet of many hundreds and none carry commercial cargoes any more.

Members asked Robert many questions, indicating their interest in these fascinating craft. At Robert's request, we have donated his fee to the RNLI.

It was great to see some letters in the "Letters to the Editor" section of the August News Sheet. I was particularly interested to read David's letter on the name of the U3A. I expect that most of you know that I agree with the original concept of the U3A and with the name given to the organisation when Eric Midwinter established it in the 1980s, but what do you think?

Our speaker at the September meeting will be Peter Webb from Tolleshunt D'Arcy who will talk about "The Good Life". It should be very humorous.

Ten from the group gathered this month at Carole Overy's home for what turned out to be a lively and enjoyable afternoon.

The book under discussion was The Comfort of Strangers by Ian McEwan.

This was one of his first books and it was clear that, as a novelist, he was going to have a long and illustrious career. The story tells of a couple who, whilst on holiday, become locked into a relationship with another couple who live in, what we are led to believe is, Venice. Although the author never once stated explicitly that this was so his succinct, well observed descriptions, which he so cleverly used to create feelings of foreboding, led us all to believe it was Venice. The story tells of the developing of a sinister and dangerous relationship between the two couples which ends in the death of one of them.

We have a problem in our group sometimes suspending disbelief and going with the flow of the story. Yes, it was hard to believe that the holiday makers in this story could have been so stupid as to have allowed the murderer to influence them as he did. However, it was a novel about how, on holiday under the influence of drink and drugs but not grounded by the responsibilities of everyday existence, two people can become vulnerable to evil forces. As sinister as the story was lan McEwan, we all agreed is a sensitive, perceptive and above all readable author, whose other books we will be happy to read.

Moving as we are towards the end of the year, we are looking forward to collecting information about the books we will be choosing for next year. All of us have agreed to obtain names of books and authors, which will be considered by the group in the weeks to come. The books chosen will then hopefully provide us with interesting and diverse reads, which will not only increase our enjoyment in reading but educate us.

We now have collected a box of novels read and enjoyed by some of us. These are being borrowed

by members of the group, with the books being changed at regular intervals as new ones are put into the box and those read being moved on to the charity shops.

#### **Threads and Fabrics**

At our August meeting we looked at how an embellishing machine works. It has five or more barbed needles which punch wool fibres into a fabric (e.g. felt, silk or muslin). This changes the texture and colour of the original fabric. It can then be stitched by conventional sewing machine or by hand and used to decorate bags, quilts or even clothes. Some of this work, by a talented group of textile artists, can be seen at the Maeldune Heritage Centre in Maldon from 8<sup>th</sup> September until 2<sup>nd</sup> October.

# The Magic Box

Ruth Tyler and I went to see "The Magic Box" at Tiptree, a play about Mechi, an agricultural pioneer. He made a fortune in London and then read all he could about farming and bought the worst farm in Essex, Tiptree Hall Farm. He experimented and made it successful. He held meetings each year to spread news of his methods when over 600 attended. He wrote books and founded 'The Agricultural Benevolent Institution' in 1860. The bank of which he was chairman failed. He resigned as an alderman of the City of London, when he was in line to be Lord Mayor. Because he was ill with diabetes, he was unable to rescue the bank and died in poverty in 1880.

A play about Mechi, entitled "The Magic Box", was commissioned by Wilkin & Son, written by Ann Courtney and performed by Mad Dogs and Englishmen Theatre Company who will be performing it on Maldon Promenade on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> September at 19.30. Ruth and I found it riveting, very well cast and acted, and very enjoyable.

Tickets are available from Maldon Tourist Office in Wenlock Way.

The ticket prices are stated to be Adults £10 and Concessions £8.
