

Members Article

My " African Experience "

A few months ago our friends asked if my husband Vic and I would like to go on a Safari with them. Oh great, I thought, two weeks in fabulous Africa. No, it was one night in deepest Kent. I was a little disappointed but we agreed Two weeks later when she handed me the booking confirmation I was horrified to discover we would be sleeping overnight in a tent and had to use a toilet / shower block. So it was with heavy heart that on the August bank holiday weekend I packed my overnight rucksack and we set off. We went to the Livingstone Lodge at Port Lympne African experience near Ashford in Kent, where we would see lots of beautiful Giraffes with long eyelashes and baby Giraffes; Black Rhino running alongside the



vehicle; Zebra playing; Wildebeest feeding their young; Ostrich guarding their eggs; Antelope, Water Buffalo, Elephants and lots of other animals roaming free as if on the plains of Africa. (a very close encounter) It is set in 600 acres and there are breathtaking views over the Kent countryside to the English Channel.



We were met by two Rangers. Warren was from Zimbabwe where he had worked as a Conservation Ranger for over 17 years and 5 years in this park. Sheldon was from South Africa and has had about two years experience. Our bags were taken by jeep to Livingstone Lodge where we were staying and our group of 17 people got into a Safari truck for a two hour trip (at 5 mph) where we saw animals very close up and had a running commentary from Warren. What he did not know about wild animals, their place in the wheel of life and the need for conservation, just is not worth worrying about. During the trip we entered an area where all the animals roam free. The day visitors to the park do not go into this area. Eventually we arrived at the Lodge. It is situated high up with magnificent views and right in front of the Lodge area there is a waterhole where the animals come to drink.

Yes, we did stay in tents but they were luxury tents with very comfortable beds and they each had a wooden balcony and chairs so you could sit and watch the animals and soak up the atmosphere whilst having a pre-dinner drink. The toilet /shower block was very modern and warm. At 8 o'clock in the evening we walked to the Lapa (the African name for meeting house according to Warren) where we had a superb evening meal and then sat in lovely comfy settees with a drink and listened to Warren regale us with his tales of Africa and more of the vital conservation work done by the Aspinall Foundation. Off to our tents about 10.30 pm only to be woken at 3.00 o'clock in the morning by the roar of Lions - it did feel like Africa then. At 5.15, Warren was making sure everyone was awake. We had a light breakfast and at 6 o'clock we were back in the Safari truck for an amazing dawn Safari trip. Back to the lodge and straight into the Lapa for a full breakfast. After 9.00 am we were back in the main park. The end of our overnight Safari.

The park does not open until 10.00 am so we were able to go and see the Lion and Tiger enclosures without anyone else being there. I have never been so close to these animals before. This is a very different experience to a normal Zoo or Safari Park.

All the wild cats are in special large enclosures and so are all the Monkeys. It is all very open and not too much wire fencing. We also saw four enormous Silver Back Gorillas being fed. It was



wonderful to see them in their paddock with so much space to move about in and no wire fences.

were also free to roam around magnificent gardens of Port Lympne Mansion House and the house itself. This was the home of John Aspinall and it has rooms with walls and ceilings covered in amazing animal paintings. John Aspinall spent his life involved with conservation and this African Experience is still promoting the idea and lots of the animals have been successfully bred and returned to the wild. It is quite amazing how so many of our wild animals are now extinct or are so close to extinction because of mans' ignorance. What a terrible loss for our planet it will be if we do not look after the ones that are left - not just for our Grandchildren or us but for our Great-Great grandchildren.



This was an amazing experience. Warren was a fountain of knowledge and we were lucky the weather was kind to us and such a close up experience with wild animals was unforgettable.

Would I go again? YES. This is probably as close to a real African Safari I will ever get. And with those tents I was dreading? They were more like little hotel rooms rather than the very basic ones I remember camping in when I was a child on holiday with my parents.
