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

Lots of Little Egrets, huge numbers of Godwits, mostly Bar tailed, Redshanks, Greenshanks and a couple of Ruff out there too. There were lots of Cormorants fishing and the wonderful lonely sound of the Curlew's call across the water. When we tore our eyes from the estuary and checked the gravel pits we found Lapwing and several types of duck. Oh, and if you want to see a 'murmuration of starlings' try the Basin sea wall at dusk. It may not be as big as those you see on the tele but there are hundreds and hundreds of starlings there at present and they will all get together to roost.

French Group

French Conversation

French Improvers

One of the pitfalls when learning French is what are known as 'faux amis' – false friends. These are French words which have a similar spelling to an English word but a completely different meaning, which can lead to considerable confusion. Here are some examples:

Avoir envie de is a common expression meaning to want something – it has nothing to do with envy which, in French, is *jaloux*. If someone says they are *blessé*, you might imagine they've just been to church. In fact, it means they're wounded.

Other 'faux amis' include *attendre* (to wait); *coin* (a corner); *déception* (a disappointment); *introduire* (to insert); *librairie* (a bookshop); *monnaie* (small change); *pain* (bread); *le pub* (publicity); *rester* (to stay); *pièce* (a coin or a room) and *sale* (dirty)

We were blessed with fine and sunny weather for our visit to Willingale while other parts of the country were suffering the early effects of various hurricanes in the offing.

There's nothing quite like the beauty of an ancient Essex village basking in autumn sunshine - and Willingale offers more than most in the form of two historic churches sitting side by side and surrounded by a shared churchyard.

Unlike previous village visits, we had the benefit of two knowledgeable guides, one each for these churches dedicated to St Christopher and St Andrew respectively; 14th century St Christopher's is the newer by some two centuries and was built to accommodate the overflow of St Andrew's churchgoers in this increasingly wealthy and burgeoning wool village.

In fact, once upon a time the two churches served the adjoining parishes of Willingale Doe and Willingale Spain, named for their ruling families and separated by an invisible line between the churches. One can still appreciate their centuries-old prosperity in their beautiful stained glass windows, the elaborate monuments to their wealthier parishioners and in the sheer quality of the churches' construction. If this all sounds complicated, well, it is!

Perhaps a second visit is called for to learn more about this fascinating village.

Music Appreciation Group

The theme for our September get together was the sea, and the music was only *occasionally* given added percussion by the builders still working in my house! Fortunately this did not make it impossible to hear.

Perhaps surprisingly, we found little music on this subject written before the romantic era – in fact we only heard one piece written before 1800 and this was Vivaldi's *La Tempesta di Mare*.

We found a great deal of music about the sea written in the early part of the 20th Century, by many British composers such as Vaughan Williams (*A Sea Symphony*), Elgar (*Sea Pictures*), Arnold Bax (*Tintagel*), Grace Mary Williams (*Sea Sketches*), Britten (*Sea Interludes from Peter Grimes*), John Ireland's *Sea Fever* and Sir Granville Bantock (*Hebridean Symphony*). Composers of other nationalities of course also wrote about the sea in the same era, e.g. Debussy (*La Mer*), Ravel (*Une Barque sur l'Océan*), Charles-Valentin Alkan (*Song of the Madwoman on the Seashore*) and the American Ernest Bloch (*Poems of the Sea*).

We also heard some very well-known pieces such as Mendelssohn's *Fingals Cave*, *The Sea and Sinbad's Ship* by Rimsky-Korsakov, *The Aquarium* by Saint-Saens and *The Flying Dutchman* by Wagner. We discovered that the last piece was from an opera about a ghost ship which was seen by sailors but which never arrived in port.

We also had some lighter moments with Gilbert and Sullivan *I am the Monarch of the Sea* from *HMS Pinafore* and a very rousing Last Night of the Proms performance of Henry Wood's *Fantasia on British Sea Songs* which culminates in *Rule Britannia!*

So, it was a very varied programme of music which introduced us to some little known composers and also reminded us of some other well-known names who have taken the sea as their inspiration.
