#### **Family History**

If any of your ancestors came from East London they may be unfortunate enough to have been buried in Woodgrange Park Cemetery. The postal area of Woodgrange Park Cemetery was Manor Park, but I believe it's now regarded as Newham.

Previously a rural area, and originally part of Stratford Abbey it was first recorded in 1198.

It was bought with the intention of a privately owned non-denominational burial site, and opened in Victorian England in 1889.

On the right as you enter the gates, is an area of raised tombs with huge granite memorials, which I assume were the wealthier patrons. There are photographs of black plumed horses pulling the ornate hearses through these gates.

Frederick Charrington (d.1936) is buried here. Not popular with his brewing family as he actively condemned the 'demon drink' leading many marches and demonstrations.

Eventually, as the years went on, the owners died, it changed hands many times. The graves fell into disrepair as their owners also died. The graves sank and became overgrown with ivy, nettles and grass. Even saplings sprouted up through the graves.

The churches were uninterested in becoming involved - not consecrated ground. It was private land so the council could do nothing.

So, it was sold to a company that in turn sold part of it to property developers. One section was in the worst condition for neglect, it was the paupers (common ground).

Now, you may think you cannot dig up a grave, but they did, thousands of them, (including men that had fought in the war, and blitz victims), supposedly reinterred elsewhere, although it's not quite known where. My paternal grandparents were in that section and are now presumably under the block of flats. My maternal grandparent's grave is still there, in a different section, and still intact.

Other parts of the cemetery are being reused with burials every week.

The derelict red brick gothic chapel has now been demolished.

The next meeting will be 10.00 am Friday 7th October.


