

Mike Logan-Wood was the speaker at our October meeting and he let us into his life as an auctioneer. On leaving school, Mike was unsure how he was going to earn a living, but as a boy he was interested in the activities at the local market where the farmers brought their livestock to be sold. Mike's father secured him a position as a trainee with a local auction house and supported him throughout his period of training. Mike has a very likeable personality, he smiles as he talks, he engages with his audience, he does

not labour his points and he speaks clearly and concisely. As an auctioneer he had to work quickly, often at the rate of 100 lots per hour and he was still able to enthral us with his own style of the fast and musical form of bidding-up (in old money of course - pounds, shillings and pence!). With such a short time available for bidding, he would start at a price and drop it until he had his first bid. By carefully watching his audience, but not looking at anyone in particular, he would start bidding himself until he receive a genuine bid, hoping that he could get the bidding up to the reserve price. All very theatrical stuff. In fact, he thought that a course at RADA would be the best qualification for an auctioneer.

Those of us who address meetings such as ours could learn a lot from Mikes approach. He said that no matter what difficulties occurred during bidding, he had to stay calm and be in total control of the situation. This could not have been easy when the adrenaline was pumping furiously and at the fall of his gavel he had made a legal and binding contract between the buyer and the seller!

As the tide went down we saw the Oystercatchers and Curlews feeding at the water's edge with Little Egrets and a lone Heron feeding on the salt marsh just outside the hide. Herons always look so stately standing as if on guard duty.

Today I think I can add another first for the group. We were able to identify a Spotted Redshank. The books came out, and with Alex and Grahams Scopes in action, we were confident to say, yes, that was a Spotted Redshank! As a group we have not seen them before so decided for us it was a rare sighting!!!


The meeting for the Advanced Italian Conversation Group had to be postponed until Monday 29th October, too late to be included in this issue of the Newsletter.

Reading and Books Group

Sarah Waters is the author of 'The Little Stranger', the book chosen for this month. She is an author we have read and appreciated before.

The story was something of a departure from her previous novels but, once again, has chosen a period which she was able, as in her other novels, to depict with clarity and authenticity.

In a dusty post-war summer, in rural Warwickshire, a doctor is called to a patient at the lonely, 'Hundreds Hall'. Home to the Ayres family for over two centuries, this Georgian house, once grand and handsome, is now in decline. Its masonry is crumbling, its gardens choked with weeds, its owners, mother, son and daughter, are struggling to keep up appearances in a changing society. But are the Ayres haunted by something more sinister than a dying way of life. Little does Dr. Faraday know how closely, and how terrifying, their story is about to become entwined with his.

This is Sarah Waters attempt at a spine chiller where she skilfully ratchets up the suspense as events at 'Hundreds Hall' grow ever more highly charged, even downright chilling.

We all seemed to enjoy the story, but like so many other modern novels, it was considered too long. We blame the publishers who seem today to be asking novelists to provide us all with thick books! It would seem they do not ask the reader what they want if our group is anything to go by!

We all enjoyed the interesting social dynamics incorporated in the story all of which had meaning for our age group most of us, having grown up in this period of fast moving social change. We were puzzled by the 'Little Stranger' and did not reach a consensus of opinion about who he/she actually was and the significance of this presence to the story. Although we enjoyed this supernatural tale and its meditation on the nature of the British and its class system, it was not considered to be one of her best books, in spite of the claims on the cover.

We discussed a different approach to choosing our monthly reads for next year and hope to obtain the co-operation of the library.

We welcomed two new members Ann Abbott and Joyce Woodham and look forward to their contributions to our group discussions.

The group now has a full complement of members.
