The People's Post

Next time I post a letter I will look at the pillar box with more interest. The history of the designs and colours used, the introduction of a prepayment system for letters (aka a stamp) rather than payment on receipt, stories of post boys on horses armed with blunderbusses, long distance mail coaches and delivery systems which required houses to be numbered to modern drones potentially dropping off mail from the air. All this and more was related to us by our wonderfully informative Blue Badge Guide Doug.

Starting at the Museum of London we undertook a short walking tour of the original postal district (BT still have their HQ there), then a drive round some former coaching inns in the Holborn area before arriving at Mount Pleasant sorting office, adjacent to the new Postal Museum which is full of interesting artefacts. Then, below the sorting office, a trip on the Mail Rail, an underground line constructed in 1927 from Paddington to Aldgate to speed up distribution of mail around and from London. Originally driverless, the line which closed in 2003, now offers visitors a 20 minute journey with a running commentary, explaining how the system worked with trains leaving every four minutes as mail arrived on conveyor belts from the sorting offices above the stations. A most enjoyable trip but a word of warning to the very tall, broad or claustrophobic – this may not be for you! The coaches are very cramped and the tunnels are sometimes very small.

It was a great day out, full of interest and information.
