Technical Computing Group

Apparently a particular Microsoft program, Office 2007, which included Outlook, was giving trouble trying to find all the emails. Apparently this had been an ongoing problem. We discussed it in detail and offered various advice from members.

I mentioned that I had purchased a program called "Dragon Naturally Speaking", which is text from words spoken into a microphone by myself. The group seemed quite interested and I was able to take them to my PC give a working demonstration. Some members also tried speaking into the microphone and were amazed to see their spoken words come out on the screen in the word processor document. This method can be used for an email dictation or inserting data into a spreadsheet. In fact, this report is being done by this method. I am not using the keyboard at all just speaking into a microphone and the text appears on the screen. Mistakes are able to be rectified by voice prompts into the microphone. Say the keyboard has to be used to delete something the microphone won't do, you can just speak normally and the writing catches you up and do not have to wait for each word to appear on the screen. Using various commands spoken into the microphone you are able to delete mistakes, add capital letters and enter numbers. It is an amazing piece of software.

I had the use of the U3A laptop recently. The anti-virus software had expired; I was able to install a new version which will last for two years.

After a break for tea and biscuits we continued talking about various subjects ranging from software, hardware, motor vehicles or anything that came to mind.
