# **Advance Notice: Annual General Meeting 2021**



Inder section 13 of the Constitution of Heybridge U3A the Annual General Meeting shall be held in the month of March in each year or as soon as practicable thereafter but not later than 15 months after the preceding Annual General Meeting.

The celebrations were joyous, but before the end of January she serenely left us. I know, I was with her.

One of my first memories is of being afraid to get out of bed to spend a penny, a gazunder in those days, Santa might arrive, see me awake so not leave me a stocking of "Santa presents"! Then when I was somewhat poorly, over 6weeks confined to my bedroom and a pile of presents I couldn't play with, hard for a 6/7 year old. Then the Great Aunt who always gave a large bar of Peter's chocolate, black and very bitter, wound it down and of course, the compulsory "Thank-you" letters!

Time moves on, the magic wanes until one's own children arrive, so before they did and working on a farm with stock I volunteered for Xmas and Boxing Day feeding and littering. Silage was preloaded but snow and frost could make it difficult and cold, still, morning only, back in time for dinner, goose giving way to turkey by then. Remember the supermarket frozen Butterball turkey? Another place, years later the goose returned!

Parenthood brought new and exciting magic, Yuletide through your children's eyes! One problem, my youngest went to that playgroup! We pulled it off, he never suspected, even telling me all about it when I got home from work! So, so, many wonderful memories.

There are literally thousands of tufted ducks, pochard, teal and shovelers. If you look at the rafts of birds carefully you can usually spot the odd goosander, golden eye and scaup. For the last couple of weeks there has been a very striking 'white cheeked pintail' up at Layer Breton. Must be an escapee as his home is in the Bahamas and S America. Still about there are up to 23 great white egrets and half a dozen cattle egrets. Their homes were always well south of the UK until this century and a noticeable shift in temperature.

# **Family History**



This month's story comes courtesy of family history member Diane Cox who recently discovered an aunt on her fathers' side who was a bigamist - not only a bigamist - but the lady in question married a bigamist. You have to wonder if either of them (at that time) was aware of the other ones' history!

James G Spencer born around 1898 married his first wife Elizabeth King in 1928 in Berkshire England. The union, we assume to have been a fairly happy one as they were still together when in 1939 he joined the Royal Berks regiment for war service. He told the court, on his return home on leave, he found his wife's conduct 'very unsatisfactory'! He ceased to visit her again, but the lack of funds prevented him taking divorce proceeding.

In September 1944 he went through a form of marriage with Diane Cox's aunt, Rosina Grace Maloney, of Gosport Hampshire – who had married an Edward Foyle in 1933 in Gosport Hampshire, but didn't live with him.....keep up!

In 1949 the accused and Maloney took up residence in Stanwell Australia. It didn't last long as he left her, because of her 'conduct' with another man.

While at Bushley? he met Ivy Ellen Smith (no: 3) and in February 1950 married her in Rockhamton. He had told her he was 41 years of age and a bachelor, when he was 51 and married (twice)!

At the time of the court case he was still living with Ellen.

He told the judge "I'm sorry it occurred".

The accused was regarded as an honest worker. Justice Sheehy sentenced him to 9 months imprisonment with hard labour, to be suspended on him paying £100, plus 12 months good behaviour.

So, what happened to Aunty Rosina? It seems she got away with it, as no case against her has been uncovered. In 1950, obviously unrepentant she went on to marry farmer Norman Charles Wongung, (No: 3) and eventually died in Australia of a brain aneurysm.

Aren't families' fun?

### French conversation - Noël en France



As in the UK, Christmas in France is a time to celebrate with family and friends. This year, due to Covid restrictions, plans on both sides of the Channel may be somewhat altered. However, here is an account of how the French would normally spend Christmas.



Parts of North and Northeast France celebrate Christmas on December 6<sup>th</sup>. This is the feast day of Saint-Nicholas, when le Père Noël (Father Christmas) brings the children sweets and small presents. In accordance with French custom, Saint-Nicolas is assisted by the le Père Fouettard (the Whipping Father). Dressed in black, he decides which children have been good and deserve their Christmas presents, and which have been bad and deserve a spanking.

On Christmas Eve, French children traditionally leave their shoes by the chimney, waking on Christmas Day to find them stuffed with small gifts and the Christmas tree full of fruits and nuts. Most children open their Christmas presents on Christmas Day, but many adults wait until New Year's Eve. The Christmas tree (le sapin de Noël) is the main form of decoration in most houses, and is traditionally decorated with apples, ribbons and paper flowers. Mistletoe (le gui) is hung above the doors to bring good fortune for the coming year.

A nativity scene (une crèche) is another common Christmas decoration, with figurines of the Baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph and other more unusual figures, such as bakers, fruit and vegetable sellers, local noblemen, a blind man, a woman selling fish, a scissors grinder and a roast chestnut seller. The scenes are often displayed until February 2.

Many French people still attend Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve, and then return home for a celebratory feast called *le Réveillon*. This typically includes a starter of snails, oysters, seafood or smoked salmon, followed by a main course of roast goose or turkey, all washed down with copious glasses of wine. The traditional Christmas dessert is a Yule Log, usually made from chocolate sponge cake with chestnuts. Care is taken to make the table look festive, with special ornaments used as decorations.

Some French families exchange their gifts on January 6<sup>th</sup>, the twelfth day of Christmas. Traditionally, a pastry called la galette des rois (cake of kings), which has a charm hidden inside, is eaten on this day. The person who finds the charm is named King or Queen for the day and has to wear a paper crown.

In the south of France, families traditionally burnt a wine-soaked log on their fire from Christmas Eve until New Year's Day. This was meant to bring good luck. Nowadays, most people eat a chocolate Yule log instead.
